

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## WALKED SIXTY MILES IN HIS BARE FEET

WITH PROVISIONS LOST VICTIMS OF SHIPWRECK NEARLY DIE ON HARD MARCH.

MESA, Aug. 11 .- Four men with their feet bandaged in rags and their appearance generally bad, arrived in Mesa yesterday morning. They purchased four pairs of shoes, and said thep planned to travel from the Verde country to Mesa in a boat, and had supplies, guns, etc., for the trip in the boat. All went well until the bont struck a rock in the river and their boat was wrecked. Two of them swam to the shore while the other two clung to the wreckage of the boat and floated down the river about a mile hefore they landed. They lost everything and were left stranded mixty miles from Mesa in the mountains. They had taken their shoes off so they would be able to get into the water and push the boat over shallow places.

They fied their feet in rags and picked their way over the rocks and mountains to Mesa. The only food they had was what they could get from the indians along the route, mostly melons and the like. They were in a pitiable condition when they renghed Mesa.
