We learn that since Sunday, the 27th ult., more than 200 Indians have left the Date Creek reservation. The removal of all the Indians from Date Creek to the Verde reservawhere some of them have had a residence before. Some of these high-toned Apache-Mohaves say they will fight before the will go to the Verde. Let them sail in; the quicker they make a fight the sooner we shall get rid of the wretches, and it makes no difference where they start from. Some of them are sure to break out from any reservation they may go to, sooner or later.

Just as we go to press, an officer from Fort Whipple informs us that the Indians, to the number of 400 to 450, started quietly on Thursday for the Verde reservation. Lieut. Schuyler, with a detachment of 25 men, is es-corting the party. Some of Jemaspie's band had returned and are with the party. About 100 are supposed to be in the mountains, and as Capt. McGregor is in that section with his comaany, the Indians will be likely to see trouble unless they keep quiet. ford was about starting for the Eastern States. Also, that Jas. H. Toole and a Miss Dexter were to be married in Tucson May 1st.

T. C. Warden and lady arrived from California on Sunday, having made the trip from Los Angeles in 14 days.

Judge Howard arrived from Yuma vesterday, and will leave to-day for Prescott. The Padre came over from the Gila on Monday last, and has gone up to the Tempe

That they have visited the County jail and find the wants of the prisoners administered to in a becoming manner. The jail is insecure and badly ventilated.

That to warra t the safe keeping of the prisoners, they recommend that there be placed around the same, a day and night 51 Front St. Sacramento. watch, sufficient to insure their safe detention and that the Board of Supervisors allow a compensation sufficient to secure the services of competent men.
